





















What a welcome! We think we'll leave our hearts in San Francisco.





On Monday, May 5th, the gang of "just-can't-leave-yets" allowed extra time for a Bay Area daytime adventure. Where better to spend a day than at a vineyard in Sonoma County. Thirty-four of us boarded a chartered bus and travelled north where the temperatures headed to the 80's and the sky was a clear azure blue. Along the way, our host, Norm Dito, narrated the drive out of San Francisco and across the magnificent Golden Gate Bridge. A quick stop at Vista Point, on the north side of the bridge, produced once-in-a -lifetime photo opportunities of the San Francisco skyline. We continued through the Robin Williams Tunnel towards our first stop, Benziger Winery, located in the beautiful Valley of the Moon. At Benziger, we experienced a true climb on the tractor and a getting-dirt-under-your-nails ride into the vineyards and fields with generous wine tasting along the way. We learned of vineyard sustainability and mother nature's important role in viticulture. After lunch, Teresa led us to the 60,000 square feet labyrinth of caves at Kunde where the aging, casking, and bottling processes were fully explained. Too soon it was time for the last opportunity to purchase wine and perhaps to join the wine club before boarding the bus to head home. It was a quiet ride home until we crested the hill above the Golden Gate Bridge and our co-president, Rich Martini, connected his blue tooth to the bus speaker. As the bus rolled onto the bridge, we heard Dame Judy Garland belt out "San Francisco Open Your Golden Gate." A roar of applause erupted as we gently rolled up to the Hyatt Hotel. 
